The Nuffield Press was founded in 1925 as Morris-Oxford Press Limited. At that time the Cowley factory was producing nearly 60,000 cars a year and William Morris was expanding rapidly. Morris decided to produce his own motoring magazine, specially for owners of Morris vehicles — the *Morris Owner*.

A journalist, Miles Thomas, later to become Lord Thomas, was given the task of setting up the in-house printing department with Mr C A Coates as General Manager. Premises in Morris's original factory were vacated and the company was established with a collection of small letterpress machines. While the Morris-Oxford Press was essentially an in-house operation, external work was undertaken from the beginning. The *Morris Owner* proved a large and enduring success with the principal order rising to about 20,000 copies per issue. By 1935 the Press employed 50 people.
